Heard poppdres noises coming from hallway. Ur in inveetigating discovered fire in hallvay outside apt. 6R. Both got pans of wator and threw it on firc. Varned tenent of apt. $6 B$ that thare was a fire.

Upon arrival at ocenc and finding no plasuiblecieceidental. cause for fire.
N/C Ryan transmitted a oignal 10-73.
Upon recoiving a aignal 10-73 from Yonkara'Fire Control, this Investigator responded to 35 Pine St. and reported to A/C James Ryan. N/C Ryan stated that tha fira was of ouepicipus nature.

A phyoical scene examination of the fire rovealed the following facto to thio inveatigator. That a pila of rubbish, papers, caraboard, plastics, otc., ware piled againot the caterio: door of apt. 6 E and iguited with an open flama. That 22 calibor amunteion (approz. 15 to 20 bullta) were elchar thrown or placed in vich rubbish. That eeveral of tha .22 caliber bullato had exploded from the heat of the firg, caoings and bullet heado wera found when supervioing overhall by this Inveotigator. Thio firs had eained in intensity and could have caused cariouo damage to anyose opening the doos from inoice tha apartment such as burns or bratheng flane or superhoneed gaces. That the matal coverad door to apt. 6-B was completcly offoceed by heat and flam on the oftorior. The cerpeefing in the hallway in the arca of the fire bad bean effectad and melted(acrylic type compoaition).
The diling and valls surrounding the fire on tha eouth and west sice of the hells aleo was affectod by hoat, flams and smoke. It is the dotrmination of chis invastigator that this fire was a malicious incendiary act commited by a persom(a) unknown at thio tims with the uno of an open flama (ignition factor).
Detectives Urquarhdt and Spivoy on the ocenc iniformed of thio determinntion.
NOTE : The , 22 caliber bullees and fragmente of those found werc enfon by Egt. Pufahl 464 to the North command. These bullets were placed in a glacs jar and ecaled by the Iavestigatora

Also on the scene were Dats. Lorenzo and Oakley who were called to the ocene by Detectives Spivey and Urquardht in a possible comnection in another case being inveotigatod by the Detective Dimion.

Mr. Craig Glassman said that at that time he had heardmale volces in the hallway shouting to him that there was a firo outside his door and not to open if. Mres sit: Giassman said that ha thought that the voices sounded like his neighbors who liveu in apt. A check by this Investigator revealed that these wore tho voices of Mr. Pogtell Christian, age 34, and C. Johnson, age 32, of apt.

Mr. C. Glassman called the Pire Department by telephone after being wamed by hia two neighbors. When esked by this Inveatigator if he linas of anyono who may be capable of doing such a thing egainst-him, Mr. Glessman stated that ho had recoived two threatening letters on his lifo, one in June and one in July. That he is Corporal with tho Weatcheoter County Sherriff's Office and that tha Sherrifh offico has been conducting anilnvestigation commanded by Envostigator David Feliciano of that office.

1ir. Glassman stated that he could :- not reveal any information without permission from Investigator Foliciano. Dets. Spivey and Urquardint said they would concact Mr. D. Foliciano of the Sherriff's Office.

This Inveatigator called Investigator David Fclicispio on August 8, 1977, and he confirmed that Mr. Craig Glassman had received two threatering letters, plus a third letter that Mr. C. Glassman found in his mailbox after this fire which was also a threatoning lettor. Mr. D. Feliciano eald that he was in contact with Yonkers Detectives eince the fire over the case.

When asked by this Investigator if Mr. Craig Glaseman was a full tame employee of the Sherriff's office, Mr. D. Feliciano said "No". Mr. Feliciano eaid that Mr. C. Glaesman belonged to the Sherriff's auxilliary and holds a pcace officers status. Mr. D. Feliciano did not know where lir. C. Glasenan was employed full time. This Information was relayed to Det. Urquardht by this Investigator by telephonc on 8/8/77. A check as to whore Mr. C. Glassman works full time till be made by chis Inve日tigator.

Mr. S. Glassman, age 67, atated that he was Craig Glassman's father. That he was visiting his son and realdes in Florida. Mr. S. Glassman said that he could add iftele more to what his eonsaid except that the last time the door was npened was at 11:30 p.m. then Craig's wife, Margutite Glassman, left the previous evening. That at that time the hallway was cleat and there were no signs of rubbish against the Coor.

Note: Mrs. Margurite Glassman, age 28, reaides at 130 Glenwood Avenue, apt. 68, and is currentiy separated from her huoband, Craig Glescman. Mrs. M. Glasarian'o tolephone \#965-4763. Attempts to contact Mrs. Margurite Glassman to dats have mot with with negative reaults.

Mr. Postell Chribtian and Mr. C. Johnson occupants of apt. 6G, both stated that they heard noises in the halivay coming from outaide their door. That upon investigating they did not see enyone in the hallway but did discover a fire outside the door to apt. G-E. That they fought the fire with pans of water from their apartment and warned tha peopla insida apt. 6E not to opon tha door. Mr. C. Johneon and P. Chriatian had no othar information to offer at this time.

Other occupants in the ballway and on the oixth floor had no information of eluo to offer at this time.

Note : Mr. Craig Glassman also in his atatemen ald that he had a complaint from his neighbor who lives directly over him about his tolopiston being too loud. A check revealed that this is apartment $7-\mathrm{E}$ occupied by a Mr. David Eorkowitz. Ur. Rerkowits could not be contacted by this Investigator at this time.

Samples of the hallway. rug ware taken, marked and sent to the state Police Lab for analysis.

Mrs. Marguerite Glassman was contacted by this Investigator by telephone on $8 / 8 / 77$ at 1605 hours. Mrs. Glasoman said chat sha received no threats and that the has been away to New Hampshire over the weekend. Mrs. Glassman also said teat hor husband Craig Glassman started a uaw job today at Montifiore Hospital in NyC and that ho is a male nurse'.

Yonkers detectivies are investigating a onealarm rubbish fire that brolse out, Saturday morning on : the sisth floor of a seven story apartment building at 35 Pine. St., after firefighters discovered several . 22 caliber bullets in the debris.

The fire, which started at 7:34 a.m. Saturday in a pile of rubbish that had been left in a sixth-floor hallway, was declared the work of a amsonits by Yonkers Fire Department investigators. who believe someone used a match or cigaret lighter to ignite the rubbish.
Upon searching the pile; - according to fire officials; firefighters discovered between 15 and 20 revolver bullets, some of which had exploded from the heat of the fire. The bullets were turned over to Yonkers detectivies who are continuing the investigation.

Six companies responded to the one-alarm blaze, "which was reported under .control at 7:46 a.m. ACcording to fire officials, tenants from apartments near the rubbish helped keep the fir from - spreading , by throwing water on it before fire vehicles arrived at the scene.
Noone was hurt by the fire or the exploding bullets. according to fircfighters. who said they saw no need to evacuate the buildi:g upon arriival.

SUBJECT: Visit by Mr. Joaquin Neto, Address and Newspaper Article in The Herald Statesman, Wednesday, September 21, 1977

On about June 1, 1977, Lir. Joaquin Neto, AddresS, known to me in the Portuguese community, appeared at the Internal Affairs Division office on a personal basis and related an incident to the undersigned involving a fire bombing of his home at Address on May 13, 1976. The undersigned nroceeded to the Records Division and pulled out the report of said incident submitted by P.O. Taylor i P.O. Hogue. Said report \#26630 indicated that some unfnown person(s) threw a bottle filled with gasoline at the Netto home which wes occupied. Said incident occurred at 3:42AM with no witnesses. The fire went out quickly and no injuries were reported. Investigation by F.O. Taylor and Hogue failed to reveal any evidance that could indicate who the responsiblo persons were. The Detective Division was notified.

The undersigned advised Mir. Vetto of the investigation and the lack of information to determine the responsible persons and asked Fr. Neto if he had any suspects or was having any neighbor problems. Mr. Neto stated that he did not have any idea who might have thrown the fire bomb at his home and was puzzled as to why the incident occurred. The undersigned advised Mr. Neto to keep in tocch with the under igned if any new developments occurred. No contact was made by Mr. Neto with the undersigned till after the arrest of " Son of Sam", David Berkowitz, at which time Mr. Neto appeared at the Internal fffairs Office and informed the undersigned of the following events:


December 24, 1976-His German Shepherd was shot dead in front of his house and police resnonded and could not find the bullet which had passed through the head of the dog. Someone saw a man sump into a red auto with a black top and proceed north on Warburton sve. fromilicker St. after the shooting.

After describing the above events, Mr. Neto stated it was his feeling that he had been the victim of the Son of Sam. The undersigned reminded ir. Neto that the only incident he brought to the attention of the underigned was the fire incident which occurred on May 13,1976 and was told to the undersigned on June 1, 1976 a month before the first kiliing by Son of Sam. The undersigned asked Nr. Neto why didn't 'ae show the letter that he received to the undersigned or to the Police at the $\mathbb{N}$ rth Command and he repoitea "I IIS WIPY HAD DESTORYED THE DETTERy " HE STATED HE DID HOT SEE TEE LETTER AND THAT HIS UIFE DESCRIBED THE EETER TO HIM".

The undersigned advised Mr. Neto that his appearance at the Internal fffairs Division was toolate and the information on the letter should have been reported when it was received.

A check of the Records Division by P.O. Anthony Lacaparra revealed that the Report of the Fire Incident ${ }^{\prime} 26630$ is not presently in file gndiofs sulled out with other remorts related to the investifad copy of the report on the Dead Dog reported by Mr. Neto is attached. A further check of the name file for 1976 and the street index file fajled to reveal any reports at the home of Mr. Neto, 18 wicker $3 t .$, such as the Harasment calls Mr. Neto stated he received and one in Particular checked by the Police.

It should be noted that at the time of the visit of Ir. Neto in 1976 the undersigned felt that the fire incident reported might have been connected with the Altobelli (Homicide) Homicide which occurred on March 24, 1975 and a witness, a youth (Female) by the name of Neto made an identification of a suspect(Cippola). IIr. Joaquin Neto was listed in the phone book and has a daughter about the sane age as the above mentioned witness. There is no relstionship with If. Joaquin Neto and the witness, Neto, who formerly lived on Linden St. This information was supplied to It. Nasca at the time but proved to be not valid. ( Possible harassment of a witness).
