

Judge Fuchsberg says he's a candidate for U.S. Senate

ALBANY (AP) — Court of Appeals Judge Jacob Fuchsberg declared Thursday he was not a candidate for the U.S. Senate. He said he preferred his current "club of seven" to the Senate "club of 100."

Fuchsberg had never publicly indicated any interest in the job, and was not considered a serious contender. But he said party officials, whom he would not identify, had encouraged him to run.

Although his response has consistently been in the "negative," requests and rumors "have persisted," he said. And so he held an impromptu news conference in the Capitol press room to "firmly and formally put to rest any reports that I would accept nomination for the U.S. Senate or any other office at this time."

"I will not," Fuchsberg, 66, said he felt fortunate to be serving on the seven-judge Court of Appeals at a time when "it is once again regarded as the outstanding court in the nation, barring none." He said he felt the court has great influence, and that he wouldn't want to trade that now for a run for the U.S. Senate.

Lindsay urges businessmen to lobby

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP) — Former New York Mayor John Lindsay says business representatives must become master lobbyists and use any political clout they can to escape time-consuming government regulation.

"Last year, 123 million man hours were spent in filing out government forms," Lindsay told participants in the 23rd annual Indiana Executive Program at Indiana University Wednesday.

After seven years in Congress and eight years as New York's mayor, Lindsay said he is convinced businessmen must become active lobbyists to achieve deregulation.

"Keep some clout. Politicians understand clout," he told the group.

Lindsay said he supports deregulation of private enterprise, but said private corporations to handle public business, such as the Postal Service, are often unwieldy.

Lindsay, who received national notice as a liberal Republican mayor, is seeking a seat in the U.S. Senate as a Democrat.

He said he is endorsing no one for president.

"I have enough troubles of my own," Lindsay said.

Lawmakers want details on Berkowitz benefits

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two congressmen have demanded more details of Social Security benefits they said were being paid to convicted "Son of Sam" killer David Berkowitz.

In a letter made public Thursday, Rep. Mario Biaggi, D-N.Y., and Rep. William Whitehurst, R-Va., said they had "confirmed in general terms" that Berkowitz was receiving such payments, but said they were uncertain of the amount or circumstances.

Court reverses contempt order against Carey

NEW YORK (AP) — A federal appeals court Thursday upset a lower court order holding Gov. Hugh L. Carey in contempt if he failed to come up with funds for a panel to review mandated reforms at a state institution for the mentally retarded.

The order was issued last April 19 by U.S. District Judge John R. Bartels in Brooklyn. It required the governor and state Comptroller Edward V. Regan to restore \$202,000 in funds previously denied by the legislature or be held in contempt.

The funds were mandated by a 1975 consent judgment designed to improve conditions for 5,300 mentally retarded residents of Willowbrook Developmental Center on Staten Island. They were earmarked for establishing a seven-member review panel to supervise the improvements.

Under Bartels' order, the governor and comptroller were given until last April 15 to come up with the funding despite legislative action deleting the appropriation from the state budget.

The U.S. Court of Appeals stayed the deadline pending its review of the order. In reversing, the appeals court ruled the governor and comptroller "can obey Judge Bartels' order and thereby avoid the sanctions attending contempt only by violating the Constitution and laws of the State of New York."

State law clearly "prohibits funds from being expended in excess of the amounts appropriated and for purposes other than those specified in the Appropriations Bill," said the appeals court.

Bartels' order stemmed from a suit by the New York State Association for Retarded Children and other groups to force compliance with the 1975 consent decree. Bartels acted in the apparent belief that the governor and comptroller failed to take all actions necessary for implementation as they were required to do under the consent decree.

"Under the consent judgment, the court cannot compel the governor to act unlawfully," the appeals court concluded.

Accomplice theory discredited in Berkowitz case

NEW YORK (AP) — The possibility that David Berkowitz had help in the Son of Sam killings has finally gotten into a legal forum, but evidence presented so far at a police detective's department disciplinary hearing discredits the accomplice theory.

The hypothesis was pushed by Detective Henry Cinotti, and it is clear from the hearing, which resumes Friday, that the Police Department hierarchy thought enough of his ideas to embark last Aug. 14 on a "discreet and confidential investigation" into whether Berkowitz had helpers in killing six persons and injuring seven others.

But three months later the probe was ended, the department remained firm in its position that Berkowitz acted alone, and Cinotti, a 17-year veteran of the force, faced nine charges that he violated department rules and procedures.

Cinotti's chief informant in building the theory, the department contends, was Veronica Luchen, a Queens woman whose unorthodox religious practices made headlines in the 1970s when she claimed she frequently had visions of the Virgin Mary and procurators.

The charges against Cinotti could lead to his dismissal from the force. The most serious accusations are that he disclosed orders that he gave freelance writer Murray Terry confidential information; that he took an unauthorized trip to Miami, N.D., as part of his probe; and that while there he interrogated witnesses in the presence of Terry.

Appeals court rules in search case

ALBANY (AP) — The state's highest court ruled Thursday that a policeman can't search the tipped pocket of your jacket if it is far enough away that you can't reach in it and pull a weapon.

In a 5-3 decision, the Court of Appeals threw out the conviction of a Buffalo man for cocaine possession after the substance was found inside a tipped pocket of the man's coat.

The ruling added that although a policeman can search the tipped pockets of a man's coat if he believes the suspect can reach a weapon, the law is not "carte blanche justification to rummage through all articles" of the suspect.
