He reassured the defendant he wouldn't be brutalized; he will see lawyers, have examinations, arraigned and the Grand Jury. The defendant would listen and ask questions about the process. The defendant was concerned where he would go when he left KCH. The officer explained it would be the Brooklyn House of Detention or Rikers Island. The defendant expressed interest in his fate.

During the tour, the C.O. and the defendant talked about his army days. Both men served time at Fort Knox and the C.O. asked the defendant about the way the place looked when he was there.

These conversations were during August 12, 1977 and took place in the cell and the day room. The duration was about 10-15 minutes. Commissioner Malcolm and Peter Tufo visited the defendant separately during this tour.

C.O. Jost was not present during Malcolm's conversation, but heard Tufo ask the defendant how he was being treated. The defendant responded he was being treated fairly. After Mr. Tufo left the defendant tried to sleep but was unable to do so. The nurse brings in the doctor. The defendant complained he couldn't sleep and should be somewhere else - hunting - The C.O. asked him hunting what? The defendant replied, People.

On other occasions the officer had general conversations with the defendant. He has presented no problem at all.

On September 19, 1977, the defendant was unnerved about a book written by a reporter and the mistakes in it. The CO. and the defendant talked about the possibility of the defendant writing a book to tell his story. The defendant said he was looking forward to an opportunity to tell his story, and correct the untruths. The defendant said he may not be capable of writing a book. 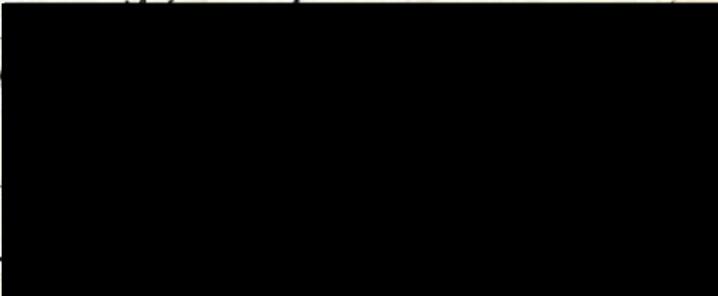
